Types of College Credit

For High School Students



ARTICULATED CREDIT

Credit awarded for
coursework
completed in a high
school or career tech
center program



CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

Courses taught at a
high school or career
technical center by a
qualified high school
instructor



DUAL ENROLLMENT

Courses taught by a
paid
College/University
faculty member



What about ?

Alphabet soup of college credit



EARLY/MIDDLE COLLEGES

Early/middle colleges allow students to earn college credit by taking advantage of articulated credit and/or concurrent enrollment and/or dual enrollment courses



DIRECT CREDIT

Another term used to describe concurrent or dual enrollment




COLLEGE PREP PROGRAMS

College prep courses can use the concurrent enrollment and/or dual enrollment course model


Establishing Partnerships

- Determine goals
- Meet with colleges and universities
- Determine if you have instructors qualified to teach concurrent enrollment
- Discuss partnership benefits
- Discuss expectations and requirements
- Agree to and sign a Memo of Understanding



Maintaining Partnerships

- Adhere to MOU criteria
- Communication, communication, communication
- Follow best practices
- Mutual respect
- Shared vision



Ensuring Student Success

- Follow program admissions requirements
- Provide in-school support for online classes
- Communicate with the college/university about curriculum
- Monitor student performance
- Use post-secondary resources
